Overview

DURATION: 2 Weeks

LESSONS: 2 x 90 minutes per day; 5 days a week

LEVEL REQUIRED: Intermediate or above

TIME TO SHINE: Model UN Congress

SUITABLE FOR FUTURE STUDY: International Relations, Politics, Law

Over the duration of the course, students will participate in assignments and projects to develop their understanding of how and why the international landscape is shaped as it is, as well as enhance key skills in presentation, negotiation, global leadership and diplomacy. Students will gain skills in research and debating, by analysing real-life political models and case studies from across the globe, and participate in a model UN congress, held in front of an audience.

Course Objectives

- To learn how different political systems work in the modern world, and how organisations such as the World Trade Organisation (WTO) and the United Nations (UN) operate
- To understand how conflicts arise, and how they are resolved
- To improve key interpersonal skills required for successful political relations: negotiation strategies, leadership skills, effective communication and teamwork
- To develop key study skills in research, analysis, and interpretation
- To learn how to form critical response and deliver clear, cogent arguments
- To improve all-round confidence in using English communicatively
